Born and raised in St. Louis, Mo. Steve Cox fell in love with aviation at an early age. In 1971, Steve joined the United States Air Force and after four years completed his duty as a C-141 crew chief. He then pursued a 30-year career in the aviation industry working first as a F-15, 747, and 767 mechanic before achieving his dream career position as the Boeing shop lead and company artist for its Research & Technology Rapid Prototyping & Modeling Laboratory.

Steve's technical model making, engineering and manufacturing problem solving, artistic illustrations, and paintings include award-winning recognition and praise from industry giants, airplane enthusiasts, and patrons from all over the world. His work can be found in the collections of The Boeing Company, Airmaster/Avalon Aircraft, The Museum of Flight, Raisbeck Engineering, and several prominent and private clients. His published work includes Aviation Week, Flight international, Interavia, Amphibious Warfare Review, International Test Pilots Association, Motor Books International, and Air Classics among others.
